Herman John Haverkamp Sr.'s declaration of intention to become a U. S. citizen, 1888. The statement that he arrived on the Fourth of July was probably a patriotic error – a ship's passenger list shows that he and his wife Johanna arrived 29 June 1882.

#### HAVERKAMP

This chapter traces the paternal ancestry of **Herman John Haverkamp Jr.** (1888-1937). Little is known of his maternal ancestry at this time.

#### German origins

Our Haverkamp ancestors lived in the Oldenburg Münsterland region of northwestern Germany in what is now the district of Vechta, Lower Saxony. Until 1871 Germany was not a unified country, but a confederation of loosely affiliated nation-states with frequently changing borders and governments. Between 1252 and 1803 Oldenburg Münsterland was part of the Prince-Bishopric of Münster, an ecclesiastical principality of the Holy Roman Empire, and was ruled by a bishop. For this reason the area was predominantly Roman Catholic.

**Hermann Henrich Haverkamp** was our earliest known Haverkamp ancestor. He was born 11 December 1812 in the village of Holdorf in Oldenburg Münsterland and died there 31 January 1862.<sup>1</sup> He was a farmer of the type known as a colon (German: *Kolon*).<sup>2</sup> Colons held permanent, inheritable leases for the land they farmed, which was owned by a wealthy landlord such as the Church or nobility. The lease could be passed down through many generations of the colon's family, along with the obligation to make payments and render services to the landlord. This was a form of serfdom.<sup>3</sup>

Hermann Henrich Haverkamp was married 3 June 1840 in Holdorf to **Maria Elisabeth Meyer**, who was born 4 September 1812 in the nearby village of Osterfeine and died 31 January 1909 in Holdorf.<sup>4</sup> They had five children, all born in Holdorf:<sup>5</sup>

1. Hermann Henrich Franz Joseph Haverkamp, born 18 March 1841.

2. Catharina Bernardina Haverkamp, born 3 October 1844.

 Franz Bernhard Heinrich Haverkamp (also known as Henry), born 12 April 1847.

4. Josephina Haverkamp, born 31 January 1850; died 9 September 1853 in Holdorf.
5. Johan Hermann Haverkamp (also known as Herman John Haverkamp Sr.), born 16 or 27 July 1852.<sup>6</sup>

#### Two brothers emigrate to America

**Franz Bernhard Heinrich Haverkamp**, the second son of Hermann Henrich and Maria Elisabeth (Meyer) Haverkamp, served as a lance corporal in Oldenburg's Cavalry Regiment #19 during the Franco-Prussian War of 1870-71 and was awarded the Prussian Iron Cross, 2nd Class.<sup>7</sup> He emigrated to the United States in 1874<sup>8</sup> and settled about 1880 in Stearns County, Minnesota, where he was a farmer.<sup>9</sup> He was known there as "Henry," the Americanized form of "Heinrich." Henry was married 3 April 1883 in St. Bernard, Hamilton County, Ohio<sup>10</sup>, to **Catharina Wilhelmina Lütmer Strahtmann**, and they had four daughters. He died 11 October 1926 in Stearns County, Minnesota, and is buried in St. John's Cemetery, Meire Grove.<sup>11</sup>

Henry's younger brother, **Johan Hermann Haverkamp**, eventually joined him in the United States. This was a common pattern, as people who had settled in the U. S. would often write to family in the old country encouraging them to follow. Hermann<sup>12</sup> was married to **Johanna Wilhelmine Shuckhoff**<sup>13</sup>, who was born 8 August 1858.<sup>14</sup> They left Germany aboard the ship S.S. *Hohenzollern* out of Bremen and arrived in the U.S. at Baltimore 29 June 1882.<sup>15</sup> By 1885 they were living near Henry in Stearns County, Minnesota, where the two households appear next to one another in the state census.<sup>16</sup> Over the years they moved within the county, living at New Munich and later at Melrose, while Henry and his family remained at Meire Grove. Johan Hermann Haverkamp was a farmer and was known in the U.S. as **Herman John Haverkamp Sr.** 

Herman and Johanna Haverkamp had five children born in Stearns County:

1. **Emma P. Haverkamp**, born October 1883<sup>17</sup>, married 15 May 1906 to Peter P. Mohs<sup>18</sup>, died in Stearns County 24 June 1929.<sup>19</sup>

Henry Aloysius Haverkamp, born 2 November 1886<sup>20</sup>, married 15 February
 1916 to Rose T. Vonderbrueggen<sup>21</sup>, died in Becker County 24 September 1963.<sup>22</sup>

3. **Herman John Haverkamp Jr.**, born 1 February 1888<sup>23</sup>, married 8 October 1912 to Mary Jessie Cluckey<sup>24</sup>, died in Perham, Otter Tail County, 8 February 1937.<sup>25</sup>

4. **Andrew George Haverkamp**, born 6 February 1891<sup>26</sup>, married 11 February 1918 to Mary Jasken<sup>27</sup>, died in Carlton County 1 September 1974.<sup>28</sup>

5. Anton Haverkamp, born 10 March 1893, died 11 March 1893.<sup>29</sup>

**Johanna (Shuckhoff) Haverkamp** died 13 March 1893 at the age of 34 from complications related to Anton's birth.<sup>30</sup> Mother and son are buried at Immaculate Conception Cemetery in New Munich.<sup>31</sup>

**Herman Haverkamp Sr.** remained in Stearns County for at least ten years after Johanna's death. He became a naturalized U. S. citizen in 1897.<sup>32</sup> He visited Germany in early 1903 and brought back with him a young emigrant couple, apparently relatives of his, who settled in Stearns County.<sup>33</sup> By 1905 Herman and his children were no longer living together: Emma was then working as a laundress in Breckenridge, Wilkin County<sup>34</sup>, while her teenaged brothers (the youngest, Andrew, was only 14 at the time) were farmhands on three separate farms in Stearns County.<sup>35</sup>

By 1920 Herman Sr. had moved to Becker County and was living in the home of his son Herman Haverkamp Jr.<sup>36</sup> By 1930 he was living with his son Andrew in Callaway Township, Becker County.<sup>37</sup> Herman Haverkamp Sr. died of cancer 3 December 1930 in Callaway Township and is buried at Most Holy Redeemer Cemetery in Ogema, Becker County, Minnesota.<sup>38</sup>

#### Herman John Haverkamp Jr.

**Herman John Haverkamp Jr.**, the third child of Herman John Haverkamp Sr. and Johanna (Shuckhoff) Haverkamp, was born 1 February 1888 in New Munich, Stearns County.<sup>39</sup> He lost his mother at age five and by 17 had left home to work as a farmhand, as mentioned above. He remained a farmer for his entire life. By 1910 he had moved from Stearns to Becker County, where he was a farmhand in White Earth Township.<sup>40</sup> He was married 8 October 1912 at White Earth to **Mary Jessie Cluckey**.<sup>41</sup> (For Mary's family history, see the next two chapters.) By 1920 Herman owned a farm in Township 142, Becker County (his brother Henry owned a neighboring farm), and had his father living with him<sup>42</sup> and his growing family. By 1930 the family had moved to a rented farm in Maple Grove Township.<sup>43</sup>

Herman John Haverkamp Jr. died 8 February 1937 at St. James Hospital in Perham, Otter Tail County.<sup>44</sup> Mary Jessie (Cluckey) Haverkamp died 24 January 1978 in Detroit

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Lakes, Becker County.<sup>45</sup> They are buried at Most Holy Redeemer Cemetery in Ogema, Becker County.

Herman John Haverkamp Jr. and Mary Jessie (Cluckey) Haverkamp had 13 children born in Becker County, Minnesota:

1. **Ivan John Haverkamp**, born 22 April 1913<sup>46</sup>, married 14 April 1936 in St. Louis County, Minnesota, to Lauretta Mildred McCabe<sup>47</sup>, died 3 December 1996.<sup>48</sup>

2. **Ora May Haverkamp**, born 20 November 1914, married 8 October 1936 in Becker County to Alfred Owen Peterson<sup>49</sup>, died 10 August 2008 in Cass County, North Dakota.<sup>50</sup>

3. **Melverna Margaret Haverkamp**, born 26 May 1916, married 7 December 1937 in Becker County to Forest Wilmer Pfeifer<sup>51</sup>, died 9 November 1964 in Detroit Lakes, Becker County.<sup>52</sup>

4. **Wilbert Aloysius Haverkamp**, born 15 January 1918, married 17 June 1958 in Alexandria, Virginia, to Doris Irene Swiggum<sup>53</sup>, died 24 March 2002.<sup>54</sup>

5. **Mildred Philomene Haverkamp**, born 23 September 1919, first married 13 September 1941 in Becker County to Erling Baukol<sup>55</sup>, married again in 1978 to Frank Brandt, died 5 May 2003.<sup>56</sup>

6. **Marie Ethelbert Haverkamp**, born 23 September 1919, married 29 June 1937 in Becker County to Bernard Heinen<sup>57</sup>, died 15 April 1998.<sup>58</sup>

7. Lawrence Peter Haverkamp, born 2 March 1921, married 3 July 1948 in Becker
 County to Beverly Ernid Erickson<sup>59</sup>, died 5 August 1996 in Dakota County,
 Minnesota.<sup>60</sup>

8. Evelyn Leioba Haverkamp, born 18 September 1923, first married 30 April 1943 in Becker County to Jerald William Herting, married again 15 February 1953 in Kalispell, Flathead County, Montana, to Leslie C. DeVoe<sup>61</sup>, died 13 February 1999 in Polson, Lake County, Montana.<sup>62</sup>

9. **Rita Marie Haverkamp**, born 22 August 1925, married 1 September 1950 in Grant County, Minnesota, to Norald Orville Brekke<sup>63</sup>, died 18 January 2016.

10. Arthur Godfred "Red" Haverkamp, born 8 November 1927, married 3 April
1948 in Hibbing, St. Louis County, Minnesota, to Dorothy Mae Olson<sup>64</sup>, died 22 July
2014 in Hibbing.<sup>65</sup>

11. Herman Harlow Haverkamp, born 31 January 1930, married 18 November
1951 in Zap, Mercer County, North Dakota, to Lillian Brunmeier,<sup>66</sup> died 8 May 1997
in New Salem, Morton County, North Dakota.<sup>67</sup>

12. Ervin Victor "Smiley" Haverkamp, born 10 April 1932,


, died 3 August 2002.

13. **Joy Ann "Dolly" Haverkamp**, born 15 December 1934, married 27 November 1953 in Becker County to Emil Duane Jerdee<sup>69</sup>, divorced 15 February 1978<sup>70</sup>, died 9 December 2005.<sup>71</sup>

### Direct Ancestors of Herman John Haverkamp Jr.



#### **CLOUTIER/CLUCKEY**

This chapter traces the paternal ancestry of **Mary Jessie Cluckey** (1894-1978), wife of Herman John Haverkamp Jr.

"Cluckey" is one of several Americanized variants of "Cloutier," a French surname derived from the word *clou*, meaning nail. (Some Cloutier descendants Americanized their names to Nailor or Naylor.) The name originally meant a person who was a maker or seller of nails, which in the early modern period were individually hand-forged, rare, and expensive. In our branch of the massive Cloutier family, the shift to "Cluckey" seems to have come gradually after the move from French-speaking Canada to Minnesota. Contrary to popular belief, immigrants' names were not forcibly changed upon arrival in the United States, but many chose to adopt Americanized names in order to blend in. "Cluckey" was probably derived phonetically – try saying "Cloutier" (CLUE-tee-ay) five times fast and it will probably end up sounding a bit like "Cluckey."

#### Zacharie Cloutier, Pioneer of New France

**Zacharie Cloutier**, born about 1590 in the parish of Saint-Jean-Baptiste de Mortagne, France, is believed to be the common ancestor of all Cloutiers in North America.<sup>72</sup> He was a prominent pioneer of New France, the French colony based in the St. Lawrence Valley of what is now Quebec, Canada.

Zacharie was the son of **Denis Cloutier** and **Renée Brière**. His birthplace is now Mortagne-au-Perche in the department of Orne, Normandy, but in the sixteenth century it was part of the small province of Perche. Zacharie Cloutier was married 18 July 1616 in Saint-Jean-Baptiste de Mortagne to **Xainte (Sainte) Dupont**, the widow of Michel Lermusier. They had six children, one of whom died in childhood.

Zacharie was a master carpenter. In 1619 he and his father Denis were among a group of laborers who traveled to New France to assist Samuel de Champlain in clearing and cultivating land for the colony. This group returned to France once their work was finished.

In 1634 Zacharie was recruited by colonial seigneur Robert Giffard to return to New France as a colonist. The recruitment contract stipulated that Giffard would provide Zacharie with transportation to Canada as well as food, lodging, and maintenance for three years while he helped to clear and cultivate Giffard's estate. The rest of the family was to be brought over after two years. Zacharie was also to receive half of the land he cleared, 1,000 acres of wild land near the St. Lawrence River, and two cows.<sup>73</sup>

Zacharie, his wife Xainte, and all five of their surviving children made the journey to New France. They were founding settlers of Beauport, now a suburb of Quebec City, where their lands were known as *La Clouterie* or *La Cloutièrerie*. The marriage of daughter Anne to Robert Drouin, contracted in 1636, was the first recorded marriage in Canada.

Zacharie and his friend Jean Guyon, a stonemason who had been recruited by Giffard at the same time, refused for several years to pay the fealty and homage – including annual dues – that they owed to Giffard under the seigneurial system. Because their contract had stated that they would hold their lands under Giffard as subseigneurs, rather than tenants, they argued that their lands were noble estates. In 1646 the governor of New France forced them to comply. This was an early example of the "insubordinate" tendencies of *les Canadiens* which were frequently noted in later decades by visitors from France, who were scandalized that the colonists did not adhere to the same social hierarchies as the old country.<sup>74</sup>

Around 1670 the Cloutiers relocated from Beauport to Château-Richer. Zacharie Cloutier died there 17 September 1677 and his wife Xainte died 13 July 1680. They were buried at Château-Richer.

#### Descendants of Zacharie Cloutier in Canada

Zacharie and Xainte's oldest son, also named **Zacharie Cloutier**, was baptized 16 August 1617 in Saint-Jean-Baptiste de Mortagne, France. After emigrating to Canada with his parents and siblings, he returned briefly to France where he was married to **Madeleine Emard** in 1648. After marrying they returned to Canada and had eight children. Zacharie *fils* died 3 February 1708 at Château-Richer. **Charles Cloutier**, son of Zacharie *fils* and Madeleine, was born about 1663. He was married 26 February 1685 in Château-Richer to **Anne Thibault**, who was born about 1666 and was the daughter of Guillaume Thibault and Marie Magdeleine Le François.<sup>75</sup>

**Joseph Cloutier**, son of Charles and Anne, was married to **Elisabeth Morin**<sup>76</sup>, the daughter of Pierre Nöel Morin.<sup>77</sup> Following Elisabeth's death, Joseph was married again 28 September 1733 in Montmagny to Marie Magdeleine Lefevre, daughter of Jean Lefevre and Reine [Mainié?].<sup>78</sup>

**Basile Cloutier**, son of Joseph and Elisabeth, was married 21 April 1754 in St-Pierre-de-la-Rivière-du-Sud to **Angélique Blanchet**, daughter of Joseph Blanchet.<sup>79</sup>

**Francois Cloutier**, son of Basile and Angélique, was married 4 February 1782 in Baie-du-Febvre to **Marguerite Baillargeon**, daughter of Louis Baillargeon and Marie [Massicot?].<sup>80</sup>

Augustin Cloutier, son of Francois and Marguerite, was born about 1801. He was married 31 January 1826 in Sorel to Marguerite Péloquin dite Crédit, who was born about 1806 and was the daughter of Mathieux Péloquin dit Crédit and Marie-Paul Hus.<sup>81</sup> Augustin was a farmer.<sup>82</sup> He and Marguerite had 10 children.

#### Relocation to Minnesota

**Paul Cloutier**, son of Augustin and Marguerite, was born 10 July 1826 in Sorel.<sup>83</sup> The 1851 census lists his occupation as day laborer (*journalier*).<sup>84</sup> He was married 23 February 1852 in Ste-Monique to **Marie Marcotte**, daughter of Michel Marcotte and Angélique Lemire.<sup>85</sup> They had seven sons. Shortly after their marriage Paul and Marie emigrated to the Minnesota Territory, where several of Paul's siblings had also relocated. By 1875 Marie had evidently died and Paul was living in Winsted, McLeod County, Minnesota.<sup>86</sup> Evidence suggests that Paul later remarried and that he died prior to 1885.

Elias Cloutier/Cluckey, son of Paul and Marie, was born 13 August 1858 in Minnesota<sup>87</sup>, possibly in Mendota, Dakota County. Elias, known as Eli, was a farmer and later worked for the railroad. He probably never learned to read or write.<sup>88</sup> He moved repeatedly throughout his life: at minimum he lived in McLeod, Marshall, Todd, Becker, and Wilkin counties in Minnesota as well as in Richland County, North Dakota. Elias

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was married 2 April 1890 in Wadena, Wadena County, to **Minnie Streeter.**<sup>89</sup> (For Minnie's family history, see the next chapter.) They had three, or possibly four, children:

 Chester Alfred Cluckey, born 5 August 1891. He was married 14 October 1916 in Becker County, Minnesota, to Inez E. Webster.<sup>90</sup> They lived in Wahpeton, Richland County, North Dakota, and Chester worked as a railroad car repairman.<sup>91</sup> He died 17 September 1959 in Hennepin County, Minnesota<sup>92</sup>, and is buried at Oak Grove Cemetery in Detroit Lakes, Becker County, Minnesota.

2. **Julius Henry Cluckey**, born 6 September 1892 in Kent, Wilkin County, Minnesota. He served in the U. S. Army from 1918-1919<sup>93</sup> as a private in Company B, 357th Infantry Regiment, 90th Division.<sup>94</sup> He was married 20 May 1920 in Wilkin County to Ruth A. Robidean.<sup>95</sup> They lived in Kenosha, Wisconsin, where Julius was a car inspector for the Chicago & North Western Railway Co.<sup>96</sup> He died 19 December 1978.<sup>97</sup>

3. **Mary Jessie Cluckey**, born 14 October 1894<sup>98</sup> in Wilkin County, Minnesota. She was married 8 October 1912 in Becker County, Minnesota, to Herman John Haverkamp Jr.<sup>99</sup>, and they had 13 children (see previous chapter for details). She died 24 January 1978 in Detroit Lakes, Becker County<sup>100</sup>, and is buried at Most Holy Redeemer Cemetery in Ogema.

4. **Cornelius F. Cluckey** may or may not have been the son of Elias and Minnie; see below for details.

**Minnie (Streeter) Cluckey** probably died sometime between 1895 and 1898. Elias was married again 3 November 1898 in McLeod County, Minnesota, to **Marie Henriette LaVallée**.<sup>101</sup> Marie was the widow of Louis Bebeau/Bebo and had five children from her first marriage: Albert, Franklin Oliver, Josephine Odelia, Henry, and Emma. Marie and Elias Cloutier/Cluckey had two or three children together:

1. **Cornelius F. Cluckey**, if he was indeed Marie's son rather than Minnie's. His maternity is unclear because various records give conflicting dates for his birth: either March 1898 or March 1900. One possibility is that Minnie died giving birth to Cornelius in 1898 and he was raised as though Marie, the only mother he'd ever known, was his birth mother. Cornelius never married and appears to have remained in his parents' household as long as they lived. He worked as a laborer on farms and

the railroad. He died 27 February 1959 in Detroit Lakes, Becker County, Minnesota, and is buried at Calvary Cemetery in White Earth.<sup>102</sup>

2. Elmer Alphonse Cluckey, born 10 May 1901 in Becker County<sup>103</sup>, Minnesota. He died 11 February 1973 in Frazee and is buried at Calvary Cemetery in White Earth.<sup>104</sup>

3. Arthur Joseph Cluckey, born 4 March 1905 in Becker County<sup>105</sup>, Minnesota. He was married 19 December 1933 in Becker County to Gwendolyn Idona "Betty" Hilst.<sup>106</sup> They lived for many years in Seattle, Washington, where Arthur worked for Boeing.<sup>107</sup> He died 11 May 1971 in Washington.<sup>108</sup>

**Elias Cloutier/Cluckey** died 21 December 1934 in White Earth Township, Becker County, Minnesota.<sup>109</sup> His wife **Marie Henriette (LaVallée) Cluckey** died 23 April 1942 in Callaway, Becker County.<sup>110</sup> They are both buried at Calvary Cemetery<sup>111</sup> in White Earth.

In records from Minnesota, members of Paul's and Elias's generations are sometimes listed as "Cloutier" and sometimes as "Cluckey." Elias's children appear to have used "Cluckey" almost exclusively.



This chapter traces the maternal ancestry of **Mary Jessie Cluckey** (1894-1978), wife of Herman John Haverkamp Jr. She was descended on both sides of her mother's family – her mother's parents having been first cousins – from the Streeter family of Dunnings Farm, East Grinstead, Sussex, England<sup>112</sup>, approximately 27 miles south of London.

#### From England to New York

William Streeter, born about 1713, was the first Streeter to occupy Dunnings Farm. He arrived there about 1737 and was married about 1741 to Ann [surname unknown]. William's origins are unproven but he may have been a son of Richard and Elizabeth (Humphrey) Streeter born near Charlwood, Surrey, England. William and Ann had eight children, all of whom were christened at St. Swithun's Church in East Grinstead between 1742 and 1754. William was buried in East Grinstead 1 October 1787.

**Thomas Streeter**, the youngest child of William and Ann, was christened 16 June 1754. He was first married 14 October 1776 in Cowden, Kent, England, to Anne Strickland. After living in London for a time, Thomas and Anne emigrated to the United States around 1794. Thomas's sister Elizabeth (Streeter) Faulkner, nephew William Streeter, and Anne's brother Daniel Strickland emigrated around the same time, and they retained close ties in America. Thomas and Anne settled near the Town of Bath, Steuben County, New York, where Thomas was a Baptist minister. He also owned land for a time in the Town of Windham, Greene County, New York, and operated a wagon shop there. Following Anne's probable death, Thomas remarried about 1807 to **Louisa** [surname unknown]<sup>113</sup>, who was born in Connecticut 25 June 1773. They had nine children. Thomas died 18 September 1831 and Louisa died 12 January 1844, both probably in the Town of Canisteo, Steuben County, New York.<sup>114</sup>

#### Two Brothers Move West

Mary Jessie Cluckey was descended from Thomas and Louisa Streeter through two of their sons: John and Richard.

**John Streeter** was born 8 November 1816, probably in the Town of Addison (now Cameron), Steuben County, New York. He was married March 1840 or 1841 at Canisteo, Steuben County, New York, to **Martha Ann "Matty" Thomas**, who was born 12 November 1825 in New York. They had five children.<sup>115</sup> John and Martha moved west about 1854 and settled in Washington Township, Winneshiek County, Iowa<sup>116</sup>, where John was a farmer.<sup>117</sup> During the Civil War he served as a private in Company B, 2nd Battalion, 16th Regiment, U. S. Infantry. He went missing in action 27 February 1864 at Buzzard's Roost, Georgia<sup>118</sup>; it was later learned that he had been captured and sent to the Confederate prison at Andersonville, Georgia, where he died 28 November 1864 of "scorbutus [scurvy] and ulcers."<sup>119</sup> He is buried at Andersonville National Cemetery in Section H, Grave #12186. His widow, Martha, was remarried in 1867 to Isaac Thomas<sup>120</sup> and eventually moved to Minnesota. She died after 1906.

John's younger brother, **Richard Streeter**, was born 7 March 1822 in New York, probably in the Town of Canisteo. He was a blacksmith and farmer. Richard married **Esther Wilson** around 1844 and they had five children. By 1860 they had moved to Fairfield, Sauk County, Wisconsin.<sup>121</sup> The marriage ended with Esther's death or possibly with a separation<sup>122</sup>, and Richard was married for a second time in 1865 to Louisa Stevens. By 1870 he had moved to Washington Township, Winneshiek County, Iowa<sup>123</sup>, where his widowed sister-in-law Martha Ann "Matty" Thomas was living with her children and new husband. Richard was married for a third time there in 1871 to Adaline Lynton. Richard died sometime after 1885.<sup>124</sup>

#### A Marriage of Cousins

**Thomas J. Streeter**, son of John and Martha Ann "Matty" (Thomas) Streeter, was born about 1849, probably in the Town of Canisteo, Steuben County, New York. As a

child he moved with his family to Washington Township, Winneshiek County, Iowa<sup>125</sup>, around 1854. He grew up there and became a farmer.

Around 1870-72 Thomas married his first cousin, **Mary Ann Esther Streeter**, who was the daughter of Richard and Esther (Wilson) Streeter. Accounts of her birth year range from 1842 to 1849; her death certificate lists a birthdate of 16 November 1844 in New York.<sup>126</sup> She was first married in 1865 to James Gabriel Cornish and had a son, Walter Anson Cornish; that marriage ended in divorce before 1870. With her second husband, Thomas J. Streeter, she had five children. Since Thomas and Mary were cousins, their children had two lines of descent from the Streeter family.

In 1875 Thomas, Mary, and their children were living in Canisteo, Dodge County, Minnesota<sup>127</sup>; this community was home to many transplants from Canisteo, Steuben County, New York, for which it was named. They moved three times over the next two decades: to Ellsworth Township, Meeker County, Minnesota, where they lived next door to their aunt Sarah Jane (Streeter) Porter<sup>128</sup>; to Eastern Township, Otter Tail County, Minnesota<sup>129</sup>; and finally to Twin Lakes Township, Carlton County, Minnesota.<sup>130</sup>

Sometime between 1895 and 1900 Thomas J. Streeter was admitted to the Fergus Falls State Hospital for the Insane in Otter Tail County<sup>131</sup>, where he remained for the rest of his life. He died there 24 February 1911 and is buried in the hospital's cemetery.<sup>132</sup> When Thomas entered the hospital his wife, Mary, remained in Carlton County with the two youngest children who were still at home.<sup>133</sup> After her youngest daughter married in 1912, daughter, son-in-law, and grandchildren continued to live in Mary's household.<sup>134</sup> Mary Ann Esther Streeter died 21 October 1923 in Duluth, St. Louis County, Minnesota<sup>135</sup>, and is buried at Silver Brook Township Cemetery in Wrenshall, Carlton County, in a grave marked "Grandmother Streeter."<sup>136</sup>

#### Minnie Streeter Cluckey

**Minnie Streeter** was the oldest child of Thomas J. Streeter and Mary Ann Esther Streeter. No birth record for Minnie has been found, but census records indicate she was born in Iowa about 1872<sup>137</sup> or 1873.<sup>138</sup> She was probably born in Winneshiek County, where her father<sup>139</sup> and maternal grandfather<sup>140</sup> resided in 1870. When Minnie was a

toddler the family moved to Minnesota. When she was about 17 she married Elias Cluckey on 2 April 1890 in Wadena, Wadena County, Minnesota.<sup>141</sup> (For Elias's family history, see the previous chapter.)


Because Minnie's life is thinly documented and there was at least one other person named Minnie Streeter living in Minnesota around the same time, there is little evidence to prove that the Minnie Streeter who married Elias Cluckey is the same Minnie Streeter who was the daughter of Thomas J. and Mary Ann Esther Streeter. The key piece of evidence is the marriage record of Minnie and Elias: one of the witnesses to the marriage was Minnie's half-brother Walter A. Cornish, son of Mary Ann Esther Streeter.<sup>142</sup>

No record of Minnie's death has been found. She last appears in the census in June 1895 in Wykeham Township, Todd County, Minnesota.<sup>143</sup> At that time she and Elias had three children: Chester, Julius, and Mary Jessie Cluckey. In November 1898 Elias remarried. I hypothesize that Minnie may have died giving birth to a fourth child, Cornelius Cluckey, in March 1898; however, it is possible that Cornelius was actually the son of Elias Cluckey's second wife. (For further details about the Cluckey children, see the previous chapter.)
